DURATION: ONE WEEK

Course Description:

This basic course on Terrorism, Violent Extremism and Radicalization (PRESERVE) will cover six modules and will run for one week. The course focuses on the following:

- a) Introduction to theories of Terrorism, Violent Extremism and Radicalization
- b) Introduction to the history of Terrorism, Violent Extremism and Radicalization
- c) Introduction to the interplay between domestic politics, regional conflicts and international rivalries; the current challenges to religious and political extremism and its impact in the world; and conflict in the Middle East
- Introduction to the role of ideologies and social movements in Africa, Middle East and Asia; nationalism; militarism; political Islam; State and non-state actors including al Shabab, Boko Haram, Hizbollah, Hamas and Islamic State of Iraq and Syria/Levant (ISIS/L).

Course Objectives

Learners should be able to:

- a. Explain the complexities of Terrorism, Violent Extremism and Radicalization with the objective of preventing the same.
- b. Understand the basic knowledge on the religious and political process, their role in the ideologies underpinning Terrorism, Violent Extremism and Radicalization.
- c. Relate with basic knowledge on violent extremism; State and nonstate actors including al Shabab, *Boko Haram*, Hizbollah, Hamas and the emergence of the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria/Levant ISIS/L.
- d. Analyze typology of terrorism.
- e. Explain the role of religion and politics in violent extremism, process of radicalization; drivers of radicalization into violent extremism; and early warning signs of a radicalized youth and a radicalizer.
- f. Expand their knowledge of ideological issues around religious extremism.
