



SURVEY SUMMARY

PERCEPTIONS OF KENYANS ON THE MANAGEMENT OF COVID-19 IN KENYA

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Survey Period: June 23-25, 2020

No. of Respondents: 647 adults (aged 18+ years), both male and female, from 47 counties.

Age Distribution:

18-19: 4.48%	20s: 43.89%	30s: 301.4%	40s: 11.13%
50s: 6.03%	60s: 3.71%	70+: 0.62%	

Main Findings

Increased Concern over Increasing COVID-19 Cases

65.80 per cent of respondents are more concerned about the increasing number of COVID-19 cases now than they were before June 2020. The rest (34.20 per cent) are not.

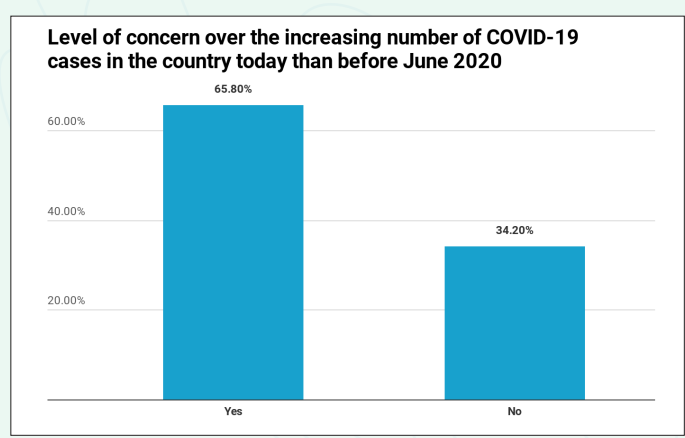


Figure 1 Level of concern over the increasing number of COVID-19 cases compared to the period before June 2020

County Preparedness

44.62 per cent of the respondents think their counties are 'fairly prepared' to combat COVID-19. For 28.31 per cent, their counties are 'unprepared,' and for 15.85 per cent 'very unprepared.' 8.77 per cent are confident that their counties are 'prepared,' and 2.46 per cent said their counties are 'very prepared.'

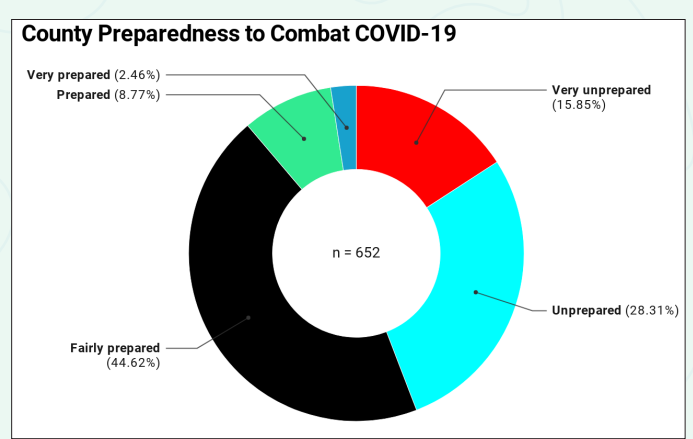


Figure 2 Kenyans' perception on county preparedness to combat COVID-19

Ability to Care for a COVID-19 Patient at Home

51.77 per cent of the respondents indicated they cannot care for a COVID-19 patient at home. The rest (48.23 per cent) responded they can.

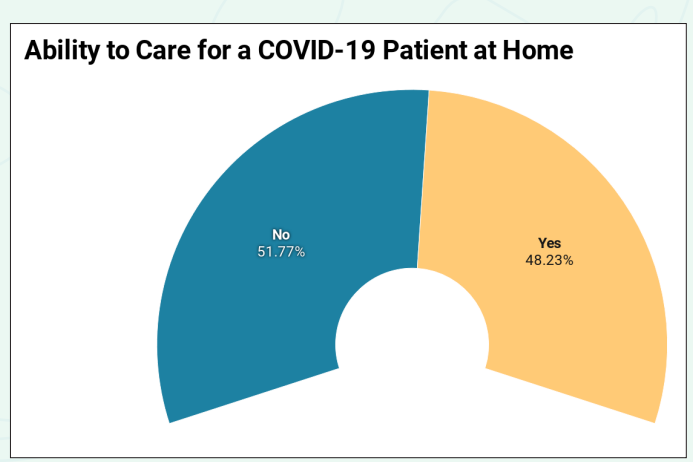


Figure 3 Ability to take care for a COVID-19 patient at home

Nature of Impact of Reduction of Curfew Hours on Economy

63.04 per cent think reduction of curfew hours will have 'positive' impact on the economy. 19.48 per cent think this will have 'negative' impact, and 17.48 per cent think it will have 'no impact' on the economy.

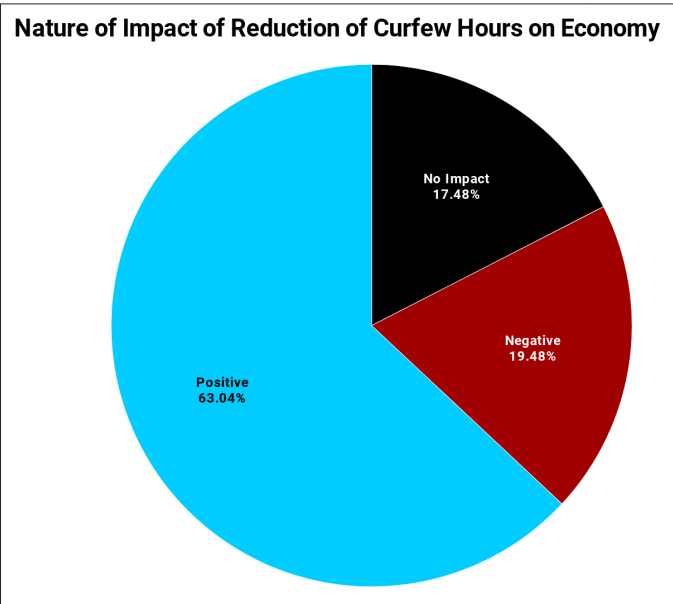


Figure 4 Nature of the impact of the reduction of curfew hours on Kenya's economy

Whether Restrictions will Help Contain the Virus

51.84 per cent of the respondents think restrictions will help to contain the virus, 48.16 per cent do not.

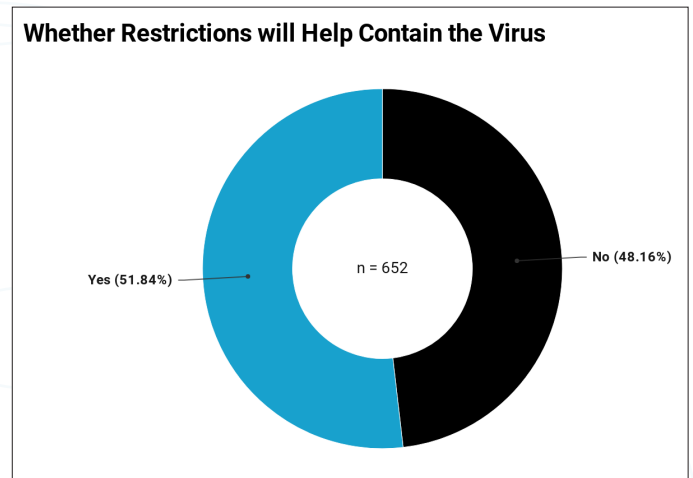


Figure 5 Kenyans' perception on whether restrictions will help contain the virus

- 36.36 per cent of respondents think that citizens are the weakest link in the fight. 2.62 per cent think media is the weakest link.

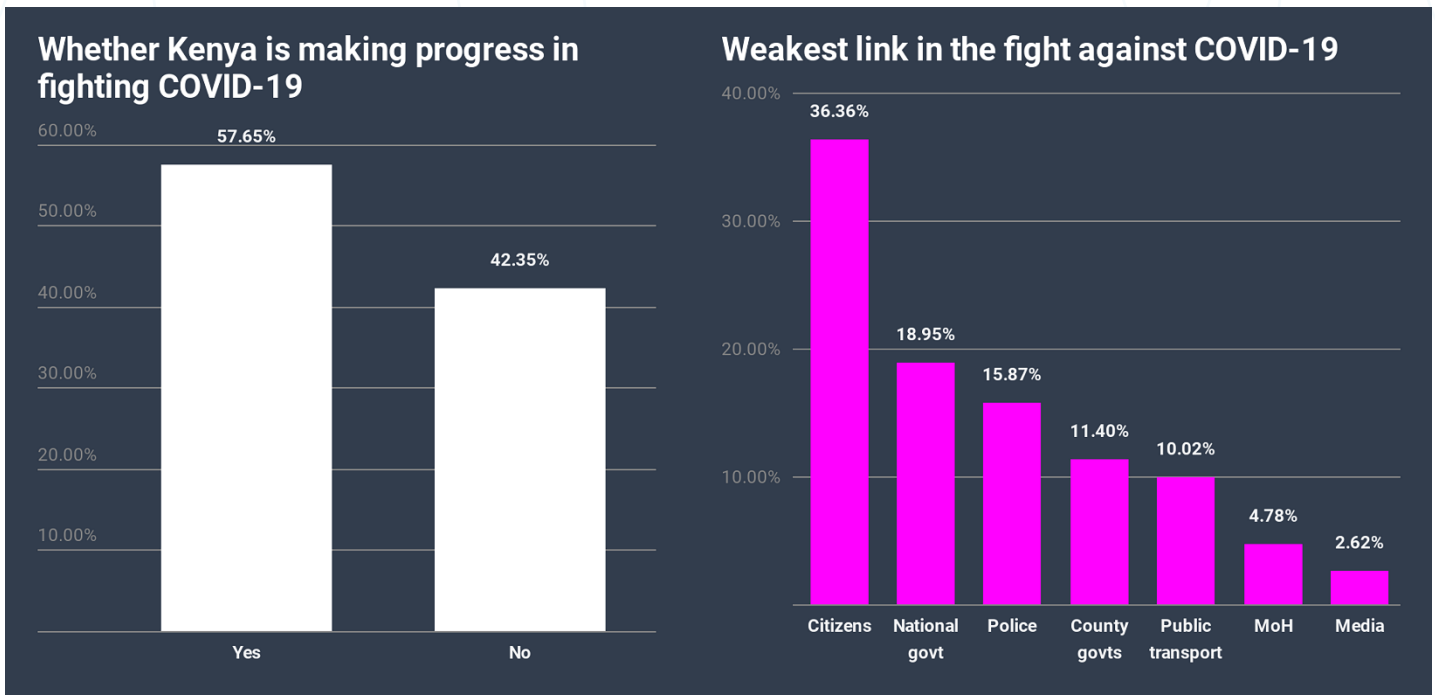


Figure 6 Kenyans' perception on whether Kenya is making progress in fighting COVID-19 and the weakest link
